ON THE ROAD AGAIN

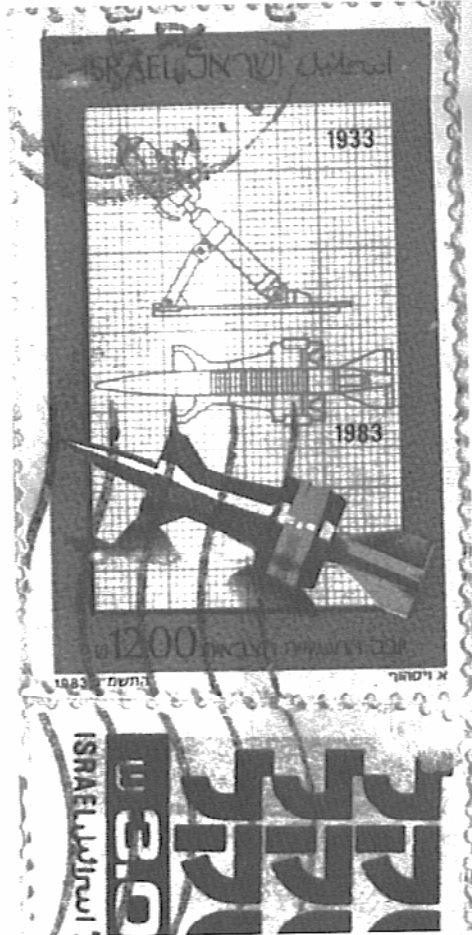
