The Birth Data Quality Workgroup and Fetal Death Subgroup




Births in the United States, 2022

This NCHS Data Brief was released August 7th and can be found at this <u>link</u>. It accompanies the release of the final 2022 natality public-use data file and presents final birth data for 2022. The number of births was essentially unchanged between 2021 and 2022 but the general fertility rate rose 1%.

<u>Infant Mortality in the United States, 2021: Data from the Period</u> <u>Linked Birth/Infant Death File</u>



This report was released September 12th and can be found at this <u>link</u>. It presents final data from the linked birth/infant death file. A total of 19,928 infant deaths were reported in the United States in 2021, up 2%

from 2020. The U.S. infant mortality rate was 5.44 infant deaths per 1,000 live births, essentially unchanged from the rate of 5.42 in 2020. Mortality rates increased for infants of Asian non-Hispanic women and declined for infants of Dominican women in 2021; changes in rates for the other race and Hispanic-origin groups were not significant.

Physician's Handbook on Medical Certification of Death

A new, updated version of the *Physician's Handbook on Medical Certification of Death* was released September 11th and is available at this <u>link</u>.



The handbook is designed to familiarize physicians, other medical certifiers, medical students, and others with the vital registration system in the United States and to provide instructions for completing the cause-of-death section of death certificates. The new version of the handbook includes updated data; example certifications reflecting electronic death registration; specific guidance on the certificate of deaths related to drugs, dementia, and diabetes; and an Alzheimer disease case history and example certification.



<u>Vital Statistics Modernization</u> Community of Practice

The Vital Statistics Modernization
Community of Practice (NVSS COP)
is a shared space for learning and
innovation and provides a forum for
jurisdictions and their partners to
collaborate in the modernization
space.

Phase III of the NVSS Modernization outreach effort officially began in August 2023 and concluded in September 2023. During the final stages of Phase III, three out of seven non-participating jurisdictions converted from non-participants to testing observers for the September Testing Event.

The next formal NCHS-organized testing event is scheduled for December 4th -5th, 2023. Any jurisdictions interested in participating as

an observer or tester are encouraged to email the NVSS CoP mailbox (nvssmodernization@cdc.gov).

The NVSS Modernization CoP continues to work toward the collaborative goal that 75% of jurisdictions complete FHIR Certification by the end of 2024. With this in mind, it is important for jurisdictions to remember that **precertification and certification** are mandatory steps in the NVSS Certification Pathway. On September 18, NCHS published the Mortality FHIR Pre-Certification Guidance documents for jurisdictions to use for completing the pre-certification process. The documents, including an FAQ on the IJE to FHIR Transition, are available on the CoP SharePoint site. Staff from the Data Acquisition, Classification, and Evaluation Branch (DACEB) reviewed the newly published Mortality FHIR Pre-Certification Guidance document at the September 20th NVSS Modernization CoP Main Meeting. The meeting recording and minutes are also available on the CoP SharePoint site. Currently, 37 jurisdictions have signed up for certification, a notable accomplishment. We strongly urge any jurisdiction that still needs to be added to a certification cohort to contact

nvssmodernization@cdc.gov to be added to the list.

As an essential reminder, certification will require jurisdictions to demonstrate that FHIR data submissions match IJE data submissions and that the jurisdiction can submit large amounts of FHIR data. Once jurisdictions are certified, and in production with FHIR, NCHS will send FHIR messages with the coded resource as a single record response.

Special thanks to technical partners CTE, MITRE, NAPHSIS, and Ruvos, for their ongoing collaboration in the modernization efforts. Their valuable contributions have been instrumental in the success of our recurring collaborations and organized testing events.
