I am asking for your help with an important survey called the National Flu Survey that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is conducting. This survey will provide an accurate picture of the flu vaccinations the public received this influenza season as well as information about other important flu related issues. Why should I participate?

Your answers help local, state, and federal health officials measure vaccination coverage and understand the reasons why people get vaccinations. It also helps policy makers understand what people know about the flu. For example, results from this survey are used to develop programs that make sure vaccinations are available for everyone who wants one. We need your thoughts to help policy makers plan flu prevention programs in the future.

How do I participate?

We work together with the NORC at the University of Chicago (NORC), an independent research organization that conducts health surveys for the CDC. Someone from NORC will call you in the next few weeks to conduct the survey. How was my household chosen?

Your telephone number was picked by a computer, and we found the address for your telephone number through commercial listings. We need to interview every household selected for the survey to get a complete picture of the vaccinations received in your area and across the country.

Will my answers be confidential?

We are bound by law to maintain strict confidentiality standards to protect your information. Every employee involved with this study has taken an oath and is subject to a jail term, a fine, or both if ANY information is disclosed that could identify you or your household. Your answers are used for vaccination-related research purposes only. If you have questions about your rights as a study participant you may call **1-800-223-8118**, toll-free. Be prepared to leave a message and say you are calling about protocol 2006-04.

What information is available about immunizations?

You may call the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention toll-free at 1-800-CDC-INFO (1-800-232-4636) for more information about vaccinations or the phone number of a doctor or clinic near you.
