



Tobacco Control Funding, 2001

At 105% of the CDC Best Practices recommended lower estimate funding level, Vermont ranks 6th (No. 1 is the highest) for tobacco control funding. Vermont ranks 26th (No. 1 is the lowest death rate) for average annual deaths related to smoking.
