



# Fiscal Year 2020 CDC Funding Profile for American Indian and Alaska Native Tribes and Tribal Organizations

# Background

## Funding Profile Purpose

The purpose of this profile is to provide information about direct funding to tribes and tribal organizations provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR) in fiscal year (FY) 2020 and trends over time. Examples of additional, indirect funding for tribal health are also provided.

## Data Parameters

This profile includes funding obligated in FY 2020 (October 1, 2019 through September 30, 2020) to

- American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) tribes and tribal organizations directly (i.e., as primary recipients) through cooperative agreements and grants, and
- AI/AN tribes or organizations through contracts.

It excludes funds carried over by recipients from their prior fiscal year awards (i.e., funds are counted only in the year they were initially awarded). It also excludes any funds transferred to CDC or ATSDR from other federal agencies or entities (i.e., funds that are not part of CDC's or ATSDR's direct appropriations). One exception is that COVID-19 response funding transferred from the Department of Health and Human Services to CDC and ATSDR and provided to tribal recipients in FY 2020 is included.

Types of funding mechanisms are defined as follows:

- **Grant:** A financial assistance support mechanism providing money, property, or other direct assistance in lieu of money, or both, to an eligible entity to carry out an approved project or activity in support of a public purpose and not the direct benefit of the government. A grant is used whenever the awarding office anticipates no substantial programmatic involvement with the recipient during performance of the financially assisted activities.
- **Cooperative agreement:** A financial assistance support mechanism used when there will be substantial Federal programmatic involvement. Substantial involvement means that the awarding office program staff will collaborate or participate in project or program activities as specified in the Notice of Award.
- **Contract:** Refers to a mutually binding legal relationship obligating the seller to furnish the supplies or services (including construction) and the buyer to pay for them. It includes all types of commitments that obligate the government to an expenditure of appropriated funds and, except as otherwise authorized, are in writing.

Grant and cooperative agreement funding data are from CDC's GrantSolutions fiscal system and contract data from USASpending.gov.

# FY 2020 Tribal Funding Analysis Results

## Overarching Trends

### Cooperative Agreements and Grants

For cooperative agreements and grants, Table 1 shows general increases from FY 2016 to 2020 in (a) total funding to tribal recipients, (b) number of grants and cooperative agreements directly funding tribal recipients, and (c) number of unique AI/AN recipients.

In FY 2020, CDC provided \$279,939,110 in funding directly to 379 tribes and tribal organizations through 17 cooperative agreements and 2 grants. In comparison, in FY 2019, CDC provided \$66,531,146 to 87 tribal recipients through 13 cooperative agreements and 1 grant. The availability of COVID-19 response funding led to uniquely large increases in funding in FY 2020 compared to prior years.

### Contracts

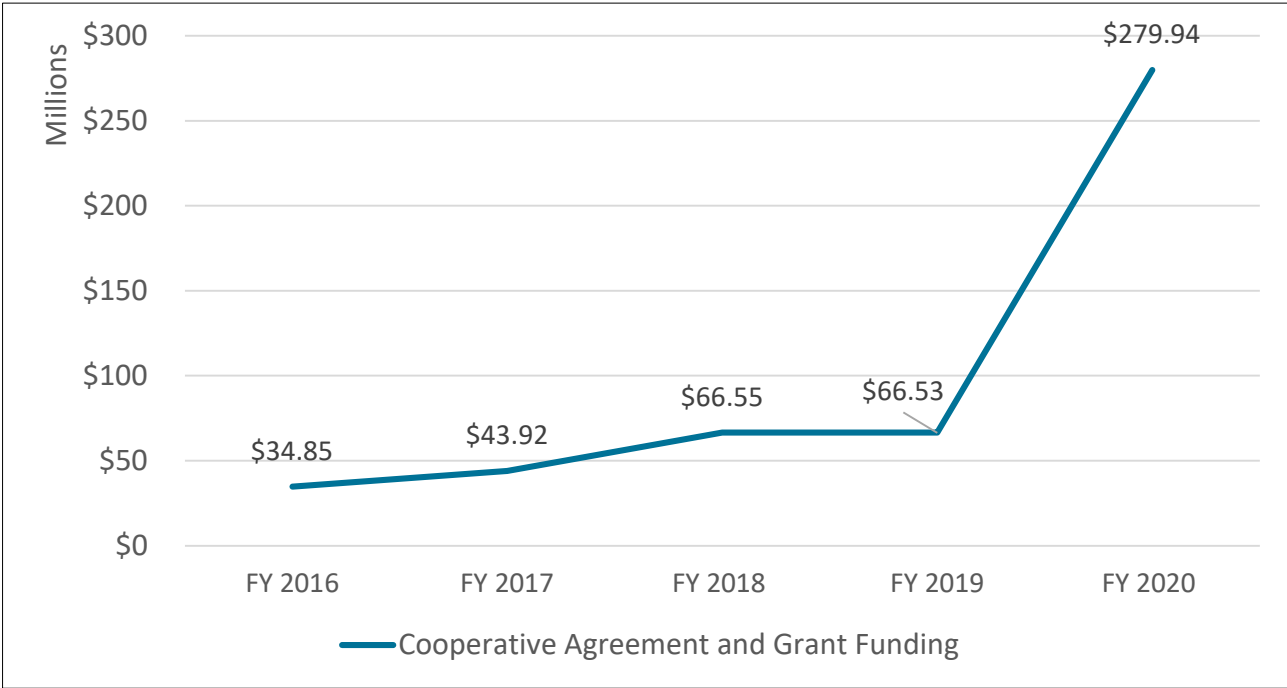
Federal contracts by definition are for the benefit of the government; however, CDC and ATSDR are reporting some contract information in this report at the request of tribal partners. The amount of contract funding and recipients over time varies greatly, according to CDC/ATSDR operational needs and the results of competition. In FY 2020, CDC provided \$147,763,477 to 10 AI/AN tribes and tribal organizations through contracts. A list of recipients and amounts is available in Appendix A. The rest of this report will focus on grant and cooperative agreement funding only.

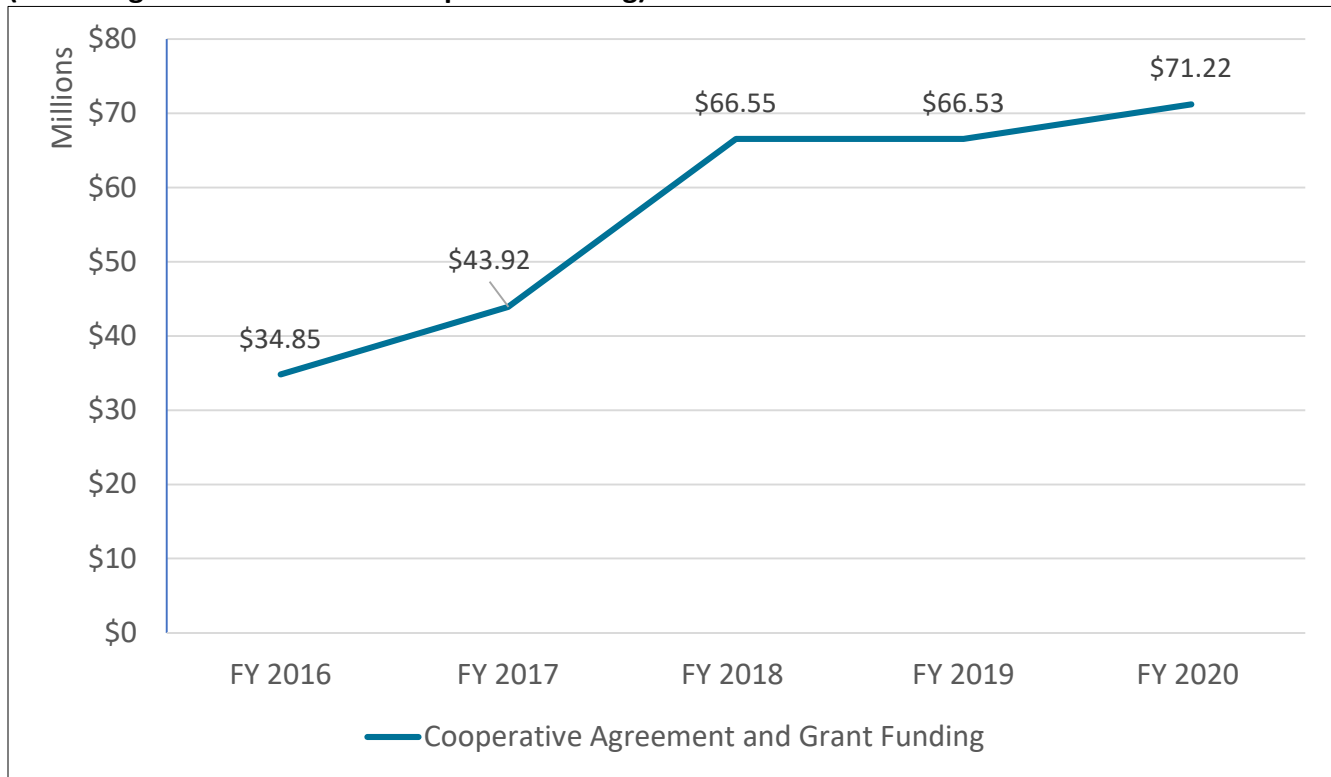

Figure 1 shows a general upward trend in total CDC funding provided directly to tribal recipients from FY 2016 to 2020. The unique increase in funding from FY 2019 to 2020 was mainly due to COVID-19 supplemental funding. For better comparison to prior years, Figure 2 shows funding is increasing, even when FY 2020 COVID-19 funding is excluded; non-COVID funding to tribal recipients increased by \$4.69 million from FY 2019 to FY 2020.

**i. Funding by Tribal Recipient**

Appendix B shows CDC cooperative agreement and grant funding by tribal recipient. Funding amounts are provided for the COVID-19 response, non-response activities, and grand totals. In FY 2020, CDC funded 379 unique tribal recipients, an increase of 292 recipients compared to FY 2019. Most of the increase was due to the availability of COVID-19 response funding and the creation of a new, non-competitive COVID-19 response grant for tribes and tribal organizations, [OT20 2004: Supporting Tribal Public Health Capacity in Coronavirus Preparedness & Response](#). CDC used a multifaceted approach to allocate COVID-19 funding to Indian Country, enabling broad access to COVID-19 resources across tribal communities. ## ii. Funding by CDC Centers, Institute, or Offices (CIOs)

In FY 2020, nine CDC centers and one office directly funded tribes or tribal organizations (Table 2), which is an increase of two centers compared to FY 2019.

## iii. Funding by Cooperative Agreement or Grant

In FY 2020, CDC funded tribes and tribal organizations through 17 cooperative agreement programs and two grant programs (Table 3). In comparison, CDC provided funding through 13 cooperative agreement programs and one grant program in FY 2019. It is expected that over time the number and nature of cooperative agreements and grants directly funding tribal recipients will vary. This variability is due in part to changing or new congressional appropriations and directives, expiration of time-limited funding opportunities, results of new competitive opportunities, and changes in public health needs and strategies. In addition, it is not just the number of funding opportunities that is important, but the scope and nature of the programs funded.

The following were **new** funding opportunities through which tribes or tribal organizations were funded in FY 2020:

- OT20-2004: Supporting Tribal Public Health Capacity in Coronavirus Preparedness and Response
- DP20-2002: Public Health and Health Systems Partnerships to Increase Colorectal Cancer Screening in Clinical Settings
- DP20-2004: Public Health Programs to Address Alzheimer’s Disease and Related Dementias



CDC continued key programs specifically designed for tribal recipients and tribal population health:

- Good Health and Wellness in Indian Country
- Tribal Epidemiology Centers Public Health Infrastructure
- Tribal Practices for Wellness in Indian Country
- Tribal Public Health Capacity Building and Quality Improvement

#### iv. Funding by Public Health Focus Area

CDC’s largest area of investment was for the COVID-19 response (Table 4). Chronic disease prevention and health promotion, injury prevention and control, environmental health, and cross-cutting public health capacity building continue to be primary areas of investment.
