- For the period January through September 2009, the percentage of persons who had excellent or very good health was $66.4 \%$ ( $95 \%$ confidence interval $=65.45 \%-67.44 \%$ ), which was not significantly different from the 2008 estimate of $66.0 \%$.
- The percentage of persons who had excellent or very good health generally decreased from $69.1 \%$ in 1998 to $66.4 \%$ for the period January through September 2009.

- For both sexes combined, most persons' health was either excellent (35.9\%) or very good ( $30.5 \%$ ). Smaller percentages of persons had good (23.8\%), fair (7.3\%), or poor (2.4\%) health.
- Compared with males, females were less likely to have excellent health and more likely to have fair or poor health.

- After adjusting for age and sex, the percentage of persons who had excellent or very good health was $58.8 \%$ for Hispanic persons, $70.3 \%$ for non-Hispanic white persons, and $57.1 \%$ for non-Hispanic black persons.
- The health of Hispanic persons and non-Hispanic black persons was less likely to be excellent or very good than that of non-Hispanic white persons.
