
#### Personal care needs

Figure 12.1. Percentage of adults aged 65 and over who needed help with personal care from other persons: United States, 1997–September 2015



- For January–September 2015, 7.2% (95% confidence interval = 6.56%–7.75%) of adults aged 65 and over needed help with personal care from other persons. This estimate was not significantly different from the 2014 estimate of 6.5%.
- From 1997 to January–September 2015, a significantly increasing trend was seen in the percentage of older adults who needed help with personal care from other persons.

Figure 12.2. Percentage of adults aged 65 and over who needed help with personal care from other persons, by age group and sex: United States, January–September 2015



- For both sexes combined, adults aged 85 and over (21.2%) were more than twice as likely as adults aged 75–84 (8.5%) to need help with personal care from other persons; adults aged 85 and over were more than five times as likely as adults aged 65–74 (3.7%) to need help with personal care from other persons.
- For adults aged 65 and over, and age groups 65–74 and 75–84, women were more likely than men to need help with personal care from other persons.

- The age-sex-adjusted percentages of adults aged 65 and over by race/ethnicity who needed help with personal care from other persons were 11.3% for Hispanic adults, 6.4% for non-Hispanic white adults, and 9.6% for non-Hispanic black adults.
- Non-Hispanic white adults were less likely to need help with personal care from other persons than Hispanic adults and non-Hispanic black adults.
