# The National Survey of Children's Health (NSCH)

- Sponsored by the Maternal and Child Health Bureau, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.
- Representative at national and state levels; data collected in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.
- Telephone interviews, based on SLAITS, completed from 2007 to early 2008. Interviews conducted in English and Spanish.
- N= 91,642 children ages 0-17, with approximately 1,725-1,932 children per state (*micro data*)
- Has information on child well-being <u>and</u> children's contexts.

- Families;
- Neighborhoods; and
- Economic well-being and receipt of program assistance.




## Children in Families at 200% FPL on TANF or Other Public Assistance ("Welfare")




## Children in Families at 100% FPL on TANF or Other Public Assistance ("Welfare")

## **Single-mother Families**

- Approximately 19% of children live in singlemother families.
- Approximately 19% of children live in families at or below 100% of the federal poverty level.

Of children in poverty, 41% live in single-mother families; N=4,621




## Children in Single-mother Families at 100% FPL on TANF or Other Public Assistance








### Children in Single-mother Families at or Below 100% of FPL and Receiving TANF




### Children in Single-mother Families at or Below 100% of FPL Receive Some Form of Public Assistance




#### Eat Meals Together 5+ days (0-17 yrs)












#### High Externalizing Behavior (6-17 yrs)


#### High Internalizing Behavior (6-17 yrs)

# Findings

- Of the four work/welfare categories, those consistently among the low performers on children's outcomes:
  - Did not work 50 out of 52 weeks; and
  - Were on welfare.
- Welfare is associated with poorer child outcomes.
  Poverty also seems associated with poorer child outcomes.








#### Job Affected by Child Care (0-5 yrs)
