




# Children by Race and Hispanic Origin (projected 2012–2050)




## Infants Born with Low Birthweight










## Children Ages 0–17 Living in Poverty




## Children Living with at Least One Parent Employed Full Time, Year Round




# Health Insurance Coverage Any time During the Year




#### Adolescents Ages 13-17 Receiving Recommended Vaccinations






## Children Living in Homes Where Someone Smoked Regularly






