AL-NABULSI: Isaf Al-Nabulsi, 10 DOE. 11 MS. ADAMS: Nancy Adams, NIOSH 12 contractor. MR. KATZ: Welcome to all of you. 13 14 That should be it. Okay, Mark? 15 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: All right. 16 Yes, as Wanda mentioned earlier, we didn't really have -- I didn't put an agenda out. 17 Ι thought at some point I had said this was a 18 19 one issue meeting, but maybe not. The only thing scheduled for this call is to do the 20 case selection for the 13th set of cases. 21 22 Everyone should have received a

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1 couple of spreadsheets from NIOSH. Well, 2 there's two versions of the one listing of 3 what we're calling full internal and external 4 dose reconstruction cases and that should have 5 33 pages in it.

I'm pretty sure this is right, one
is sorted by PoC and the other one, I don't
know how the other one is sorted, but --

9 MR. HINNEFELD: Just by selection 10 number.

11 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: By selection, 12 yes, that's what I thought. Okay. I actually 13 worked from the one that was sorted by the PoC and then there's -- so that's the one listing 14 15 with two different versions of a spreadsheet 16 that was sent out. And the other listing is a random set of cases which would not only be 17 full internal external but would be a random 18 19 selection of some additional cases.

And what we've done in the past is to start from the best estimate cases and I think we would like to get, come up with

1 probably around 40 cases. That way if we 2 lose some, it can be narrowed down. Is that 3 correct, Stu, each set? I know if this matters really, but --4 5 MR. HINNEFELD: It matters very б much. We usually do this in a two-step 7 process. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 8 Yes. 9 HINNEFELD: MR. Step one. But 10 however many we select today, we will provide to ORAU for them to add those additional 11 columns of information. 12 13 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Right. 14 MR. HINNEFELD: For the second 15 step of the selection process. If you want to 16 keep doing that process. 17 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, I do, yes. And the idea is to do that in Buffalo, if we 18 19 have enough time. I don't think I 20 MR. HINNEFELD: can get that information --21 22 That quickly --CHAIRMAN GRIFFON:

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1 MR. HINNEFELD: For Buffalo, no. 2 In fact, I would guess that it will be middle 3 of June.

4 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Maybe the next 5 Board phone call then or whatever, the full 6 Board.

7 MR. HINNEFELD: I would think it 8 would be the middle of June at least before 9 I'll be able to get it.

10 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay, okay. So 11 this is the first step. The only thing I'm 12 asking is for the 13th set, how many cases 13 should we be shooting for SC&A tasking 14 purposes? Maybe we want to end up with 20, 15 like we usually do.

MEMBER MUNN: Well, maybe it would be a good idea for us to kind of run through them and see how many jump out on our first cut.

20CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Well, yes. We21want more than that in our first cut.

22 MEMBER MUNN: Oh, yes.

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1 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: But I think 2 what we want to end up with if we want to 3 stick with the normal -- I'm just asking from a tasking -- I don't know if there's any 4 5 limitations in that way. б MR. KATZ: Doug? Mark, this is Doug. 7 MR. FARVER: I didn't receive copies of these and you may 8 have sent them to John and John is traveling 9 10 today. MR. HINNEFELD: I'll send them. 11 12 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Stu sent them around actually. 13 14 MR. FARVER: know John was Ι 15 looking for about 30 cases. 16 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay, 30, 17 MR. FARVER: So I imagine anywhere in that range, 20 to 30, whatever you can pick 18 19 out. 20 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay. MR. HINNEFELD: We'll want to go 21 22 bigger than that.

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1 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Exactly, for 2 our preliminary slice through here, we should 3 look at 40 to 50 maybe. 4 MR. FARVER: Okay. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: And then -- all 5 б right, so with that in mind, maybe I can --7 MEMBER PRESLEY: Hey, Stu? MR. HINNEFELD: Yes. 8 9 MEMBER PRESLEY: Send those to me 10 here at my government address. 11 MR. HINNEFELD: That's your DOE address? 12 13 MEMBER PRESLEY: Yes. I thought I had them and I can't find them. 14 15 HINNEFELD: Okay, I've got MR. 16 that one. 17 MR. KATZ: Let me remind everybody that this is transcribed and Eric who is our 18 19 transcriptionist won't know who is speaking unless you identify yourself. 20 21 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay, this is 22 Mark Griffon again. The one thing I was going

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1 to suggest and I agree with what Wanda said. 2 We should just go through them and see how 3 many jump out at us. The only thing that I was going to suggest is to start, if this 4 makes sense to people, to start in the middle 5 6 of the PoC sorted matrix. So on page 19, I was looking at the ones between 40 and 50 to 7 start with and sort of see how many we end up 8 with there and then go back and work through 9 10 the rest of them.

Well, that's the 11 MEMBER MUNN: 12 next big question, really. This is Wanda. Whether there are additional criteria that we 13 need to have in mind as we do this or are we 14 specifically going 15 to be looking almost 16 entirely at PoC?

We discussed this at our last meeting and to save me I can't remember what decision we reached.

20 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, I think we 21 ended up with basically saying that we were 22 going to get the best information from the

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best estimate cases which end up being around
 the 40 to 50 range. But also, the other
 criteria --

4 MEMBER MUNN: But not always,5 right, would you assume?

б CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Well, I mean, 7 you know, think about what we get out of these reviews. When it's a 20 percent PoC, a lot of 8 times they are under estimate cases and even 9 10 these ones that -- I'm surprised the ones on this list that are like 1 and 2 percent PoC, 11 partial 12 I'm betting that they're best 13 estimate.

I may be wrong, Stu, on this, but I'm betting that they did one part best estimate and then they threw in as high as possible internal dose and it was an over estimating for one part of it and best estimate for one part of it.

20 MR. HINNEFELD: Yes, some of them 21 might be dose models. Some people might have 22 full dosimetry records, but essentially non-

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radiation workers. So something that's done
 by a dose model it shows up and usually it's a
 full internal and external.

4 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. This is5 Mark Griffon again.

6 Wanda, the way I went through was look at PoC, but also look at sites. And then 7 obviously other things play into it too, if 8 9 there's a case that looked particularly 10 interesting. This is the pre-screening step, So we can just pull them and get some 11 too. more information about it. So I think that's 12 13 -- everything is on the table now.

just offering that. 14 Ι was We might want to start with those ones in the 15 16 middle. As I went through, I got maybe 20 some just in the 40 to 50 range or I think it 17 was 15 to 20 that looked reasonable in that 18 19 range. So it was just offered as a possible 20 place to start, you know.

21 MEMBER MUNN: As good as any, I 22 guess.

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1 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. All right, let's try that. 2 And then the other 3 thing that if you've got your notes in front of you, I did notice when I looked at the 4 whole list that there's some place that I had 5 б never seen before and those are obviously good 7 choices for us because, you know, it's those many Site Profile Reviews that we can look at 8 9 one case and it's probably the only time we'll look at that site through the --10 That's interesting. 11 MEMBER MUNN: 12 GRIFFON: CHAIRMAN Yes. So 13 there's a couple of -- a bunch that that 14 actually --15 MEMBER PRESLEY: Hey, Mark. This 16 is Bob Presley. 17 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. I thought that we 18 MEMBER PRESLEY: 19 talked about before, you know, on places like 20 that right there where there was one, if it had been compensated, we weren't going to take 21 the time to go back through that thing. 22

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1 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: That may be something to consider too, Bob. 2 The only 3 thing, if it's one case for one for the site, and it was compensated, then yes. But I think 4 a lot of these smaller places end up being 5 6 modeled in а reconstruction model so by 7 reviewing a particular case you're actually reviewing the entire way they do it for all 8 the cases. But if it's only -- if we find out 9 10 it's only one, there's only one claim and it's one site and they've been compensated, you're 11 12 right. I'm not sure it's worth our time. But okay, let's start with -- if it's okay, let's 13 start with page 19 and just go through some of 14 15 those and then we'll work our way through the 16 rest of the spreadsheet after that.

17 MEMBER POSTON: Hey, Mark?

18 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes.

MEMBER POSTON: John Poston. I've been listening. I just got here. Sorry, I'm late.

22 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: That's okay.

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1 I'm glad you could make it, John.

You have the spreadsheets, right? 2 3 MEMBER POSTON: Yes. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 4 Okay. MEMBER MUNN: So we're going to 5 б start on page 19 of which of the three? 7 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Page 19 of the one sorted by PoC is the one I'm working from. 8 The one, full internal/external sorted by 9 10 PoC. So if I go -- the first one I have 11 12 in that regard is I'm looking at the last three numbers, case number 596. It's about 13 14 two-thirds of the way down the page. Rocky 15 Flats. 16 MEMBER MUNN: Hold on a minute. I'm still getting to the right page. 17 What 18 page did you say? 19 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Page 19. 20 MEMBER MUNN: Nineteen. Go ahead. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 21 I'm looking at the one PoC is 40.125, pretty good precision 22

3 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Any objections 4 to that? Again, this is our preliminary shot 5 б through so we can get 40 or 50. We just don't 7 want to overburden NIOSH with too many. MEMBER MUNN: 596, correct. 8 9 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I'm going to 10 check that one off, if there's no objection. At any time, if I pass over one that you 11 12 wanted, speak up. Make sure we identify 13 ourselves though. This could be a little 14 tricky. 15 I have 604 which is an X-10 case. 16 MEMBER MUNN: Do you want to give us a couple of minutes to scan this page 17 I really and truly have not 18 ourselves? 19 scanned through these. 20 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay, Ι apologize. 21

22 MEMBER MUNN: And your next one

1 was?

2	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 604.
3	MEMBER MUNN: 604.
4	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Is everybody
5	okay with that one? All right.
6	My last one on this page is 728,
7	the last one at the bottom. Ames Laboratory.
8	That was for a double reason, 40 PoC at Ames,
9	think we may have done or two of those
10	cases, but certainly not many.
11	MEMBER MUNN: 728.
12	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay, I'm going
13	to page 20 now, unless I hear any other
14	suggestions. And I have 446 right at the top,
15	Savannah River, 34 years almost, of exposure.
16	And let me know if you object to any of
17	these, 364, General Steel. There were several
18	General Steels in here throughout this
19	spreadsheet. I'm assuming, Stu, correct me if
20	I'm wrong, I'm assuming General Steel is a
21	model, right? So if we look at one, we should
22	really get a sense of any of the ones.

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1 MR. HINNEFELD: Yes, I believe 2 that it is a dose model.

3 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: So there may be 4 others that -- I'll put a check by that, but 5 if we see another General Steel that we like 6 better, we can cross this one off and do 7 another one.

8 MEMBER MUNN: It's kind of 9 interesting to have those two twins there 10 together. Simonds Saw.

CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. Simonds
 Saw I skipped.

MEMBER MUNN: That would be kindof interesting to see.

15 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. We can do 16 that. You want the Simonds Saw one? I 17 skipped that one because I thought we had done 18 one before.

19 MEMBER MUNN: Let's do 405 and 20 406. They'd be interesting to compare, I 21 think.

22 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Wait, 405.

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1 MR. HINNEFELD: Mark, she's 2 reading the Excel line number. 3 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay. 4 MEMBER MUNN: I'm sorry. Yes. 5 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 364 and -б MEMBER MUNN: It's just an unusual thing to see, two similarities on the sheet. 7 It must be similarity as a whole on the cases. 8 This is interesting to see it. 9 10 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Right. All I have was 11 right, the next one another Savannah River one, 169, PoC 41.66. 12 MEMBER MUNN: I like that for some 13 14 reason. 15 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: And then 545 16 which is a W.R. Grace. So this was for two 17 reasons. The high PoC, it's not many years of exposure, but I don't think we've done any 18 19 W.R. Grace cases, I'm pretty sure of that. 20 MEMBER MUNN: I don't remember 21 them. 22 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: So I think this

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1 might be useful just from that standpoint.
2 The next one I have is 610 which is a Nevada
3 Test Site, almost 40 years of -- 38.8 years.
4 Thyroid, which we don't see that often, so
5 several reasons for that one.

6 And that was the last one I had on 7 that page, if there any others on that page.

8 MEMBER MUNN: 694 has an 9 interesting site that we haven't looked at 10 before.

Yes, and that 11 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 12 comes up later too. I did pick up one of these DuPont Deepwater, but we can check this 13 I agree with that, Wanda. 14 one off. And I'm 15 imagining again this is a dose model of some 16 sort. I don't know that we can do multiple ones of this, but we can check that one for 17 18 sure.

19Okay, anybody else?Any others on20that page?

21 I've got a whole lot on the next 22 page. Let's see --

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MEMBER MUNN: Mine is not broken
 down by pages.

3 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Oh, yes. I'm 4 on page 21, but I'm on case number 733 which 5 is Nuclear Materials and Equipment, NUMEC, 6 Parks Township.

460, aqain 7 And then Savannah And another reason for the Savannah 8 River. 9 River, number one, there's a lot of claims at 10 the site, but number two, we have had some experience with some close cases at Savannah 11 12 River where we had some lengthy debates and 13 they're usually Savannah River is not coworker It's their own data. 14 modeled. So I think 15 these are good ones to review for all those 16 reasons.

MEMBER MUNN: Disease site is theprimary. Interesting.

19 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, yes. The 20 next one I had, I skipped Bethlehem, because I 21 know we've done Bethlehem.

22 MEMBER MUNN: Many.

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1 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: So I took the 2 next one though, Blockson and I may be wrong, 3 but I don't know that we did a Blockson case. MEMBER MUNN: I think we've done 4 5 one. I know we've б CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: discussed it a lot. Then 288, Hanford. 7 It's lung and pancreas. 339 which is Portsmouth. 8 9 MEMBER MUNN: Yes, any reason? 10 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: The main reason on this one was the high number of years 11 12 worked as well as the high PoC. It's probably -- it looks like a multiple skin cancer kind 13 14 of thing. 15 MEMBER MUNN: Yes, it does. 16 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I'm not too --I can drop that one. As a matter of fact, the 17

18 more I look at it, it's not that -- I'll drop 19 that one.

20 MEMBER MUNN: Okay.

21 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Next one I have 22 was 683, but we have had several Savannah

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Rivers, so I'm willing to drop that one off
 the list too actually.

3 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Although like I 4 said these are unusually individual data which 5 б makes them a little more unique, but I'll drop that one. 7 681 is the next one I had. And I 8 don't think we've done ElectroMet at all. 9 10 MEMBER MUNN: No, we just talked about that. 11 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 12 Right, right. 13 So we'll check that one? 14 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. 15 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Now here's the 16 General Steel with a higher PoC, but I think one General Steel is enough. If I'm looking 17 at this correctly, I'm pretty sure it's a 18 19 single model approach.

20 MEMBER MUNN: What was that number 21 again?

22 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Well, that was

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472, but I'm going to skip that one. I was
 just pointing out that it's another General
 Steel case.

MEMBER MUNN: Yes. 4 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: The next one 5 б I've selected was 661, Rocky Flats. Kind of unique here because it's other respiratory and 7 a lot of years worked there. It's not lung, 8 but it's -- I thought it was a fairly easy 9 10 case.

11 MR. KATZ: Hey, Mark?

12 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes.

MR. KATZ: Just to remind you, I don't know, but maybe Stu needs to feed into this question, but what do you think about GSI being a model? It is a TBD-6000 site. There has been a lot of complexity to that site in the discussion.

CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: That is true,
 yes.
 MR. KATZ: I wanted to mention

22 that and also mention that there have been, I

CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. I think 4 we selected it before. Okay. The next one, 5 б since I did drop that last Portsmouth one, I think this is 7 а much more interesting Portsmouth one. Forty-one years. It's number 8 484, I'm sorry. 484, 44.9 PoC and 41 years of 9 10 experience.

MEMBER MUNN: That's a great one.
CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I think that's
a much better Portsmouth case.

And then 719 is a Hanford leukemia -- excluding CLL, yes, leukemia.

16 336, well, this is a skin cancer,

17 a lot of years, at K-25. I'm not sure.

18 MEMBER MUNN: Which number?

19 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 336.

20 MEMBER MUNN: 336.

21 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: It's Oak Ridge

22 Gaseous Diffusion Plant K-25, 43.635 PoC.

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It's probably a multiple skin --

2 MEMBER MUNN: It's another one of 3 those multiple skin things. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I'm willing to 4 drop that one. 5 б MEMBER MUNN: Yes. We see a lot of those in the ordinary course of events. 7 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: All right, the 8 last one I have on the page is 570. And this 9 10 does have some skin, but it's also got urinary organs excluding bladder, kind of interesting. 11 And it's X-10 and Y-12. All right. 12 I'm moving on to the next page, 13 14 well, if you have pages demarcated. This is I've got 754 which is 46.99 PoC. 15 page 22. 16 Thyroid from Savannah River Site. 17 MEMBER MUNN: Thyroid. We've had quite 18 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 19 a few lung cases, I believe. 20 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. 21 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: And these are also getting above 45 percent PoC, too. 22 So

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1323 RHODE ISLAND AVE., N.W. WASHINGTON, D.C. 20005-3701 we're right -- these are very close to the -the next one I have is 629.

3 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. GRIFFON: Which 4 CHAIRMAN is Blockson, but it also had Argonne East, so 5 б it's kind of -- a couple of reasons for that 7 one. And then 744, Savannah River lung. 8 We have had several of those, but this is a 9 10 very close borderline. We've also had a few that were close to the 50 percentile. 11 That was the interest there. 12 744.

And 358, the very next one, LosAlamos.

15 MEMBER MUNN: Yes.

16 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Not a very long 17 job period, but it gets into a decade that we 18 often don't see and then you have 80 Los 19 Alamos. So a little different.

Then I had 666. That's a Fernald. It is a skin cancer. Again, it's 43 years of experience. It could be a multiple skin, but

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where it's so close that you just -- you know.
 Looks like an interesting case.

3 Next, the very next one too, 517, 4 Sandia National Laboratory. I don't think 5 we've had very many cases from Sandia and it's 6 really close to the 50 percentile.

7 And then I have the next one 8 checked of, 648, which is General Steel again. 9 I would actually say drop my other General 10 Steel and put this one in. It's really close 11 to the cut off end.

MEMBER MUNN: That might not hurtto leave the other one in.

14 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Especially for 15 the preliminary round, maybe leave both. 16 Alright, I'm going on to the next page. Actually, that's all I had and that was only 17 looking between 40 and 50. Now let me just 18 19 get a count, unless somebody is keeping track. I have 25. 20 MEMBER MUNN: 21 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I have 26, so -

22

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1 MEMBER MUNN: I missed one. 2 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: We're close in 3 there somewhere. I think I've got 26. So we should probably at least get 40, if we're 4 going to try to come out with 30 because we 5 б could lose cases for a number of reasons. 7 They could be under review or they could --MEMBER MUNN: Forty is a lot safer 8 9 number.

10 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Right, right. the beginning of 11 So going back to the 12 spreadsheet, I actually, and I can be talked 13 out of this, but I actually did not go all the way back to the beginning. I started at about 14 15 page eight, fairly random cutoff, but all 16 these PoCs, most of them are one through five, 17 I thought a PoC of one through five, how much are we going to get out of those reviews, 18 19 unless it's a unique site. And I must admit 20 there may be some on there that we would want to consider for that reason. 21

22 MEMBER MUNN: Even in that case,

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the circumstances would be -- have to be
 extraordinary for a dose reconstructor to have
 gone higher.

4 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Right, and I 5 think usually the policy, if they don't --6 these say full internal and external, but my 7 guess is a lot of them are going to have maybe 8 full external because they had their badge 9 data, but then they used an overly generous 10 internal dose.

MEMBER MUNN: In order to even get what they had.

13 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Right, even to 14 get up to the very low PoCs. I would say if 15 it's okay, if you have any cases on the first 16 -- prior to this, certainly put them on the table, but I was starting at 17 page eight, number 680 which was an 8.2 PoC. 18 And the only 19 reason I picked that was for the site and the 20 same reason for the next one, Heppenstall. Ι don't think we've had anything from there. 21

22 MEMBER MUNN: I haven't heard

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1 anything from there either.

2	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Very low PoC,
3	but I thought it was worth at least a
4	consideration to review.
5	MEMBER PRESLEY: Hey, Mark?
6	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes.
7	MEMBER PRESLEY: This is Bob. One
8	of the things that I've been looking at on
9	here, nothing I've got jives with what you've
10	got, so I've been going through by location
11	and looking. When you talk about these places
12	where we have this reduction pilot plant,
13	they're all very, very low PoC. But there's a
14	couple of them have got there's quite a few
15	of them, a couple of them have a lot of years.
16	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Right.
17	MEMBER PRESLEY: With lung and
18	urinary and bladder problems.
19	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I did pick one
20	from there. It's coming up. I know I picked
21	one from there, Bob.
22	MEMBER PRESLEY: That's one of the

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1 places I was looking at.

2	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, I'm with
3	you. I'm with you. I definitely selected one
4	from there. As we're going through, if you
5	don't like the one I took, if you have another
б	one in mind.
7	MEMBER PRESLEY: I think we just
8	ought to check that out.
9	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. All
10	right. So I'm going to check for now anyway,
11	680 and 438, on that page eight.
12	MEMBER MUNN: I see 680 also.
13	Although that one well. We're going to be
14	that site is going to be covered pretty
15	well, hopefully.
16	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: That's the
17	other questions, yes. Some of these could
18	fall under SEC yes.
19	MEMBER MUNN: Yes.
20	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I'll put a
21	question mark next to that. If we get way
22	over the 40 mark, then we can go back and tone

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1 this down a little bit.

2 MEMBER MUNN: If I were doing it 3 all by myself, I probably wouldn't do 680. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 4 Yes. MEMBER MUNN: Just because I know 5 б that site is going to be well covered. This is 7 MR. HINNEFELD: Stu Hinnefeld. General Atomics, I don't know that 8 there's been a lot of work there. General 9 10 Atomics, isn't that the one down in La Jolla? MEMBER MUNN: I think it's going 11 12 to end up being -- it could be. MR. HINNEFELD: The site in Santa 13 Susana is Atomics International. 14 15 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. 16 MR. HINNEFELD: And Ι think General Atomics is a site down by La Jolla. 17 MEMBER MUNN: It is the site down 18 19 by La Jolla. I'm quite sure you're right about that. I think --20 21 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Did one of those get an 83.14? 22

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1 MR. HINNEFELD: That was Santa 2 That's all the sites associated with Susana. 3 Santa Susana, Downey, De Soto, Canoga. MEMBER MUNN: Okay. I withdraw my 4 5 concern. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: б The next one I 7 have is on the next page, PoC of 10.69. See if you can find it, Wanda, 541. 8 9 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. 10 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: That's the Aluminum Company of America, Alcoa. 11 12 MEMBER MUNN: That makes sense. 13 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Just that we haven't looked at that site at all before. 14 15 And that probably will be the last time. 16 The next one Ι have was 742, solely based on the site again, Westinghouse 17 Nuclear Fuels Division. 18 19 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. I don't think 20 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: we've done any cases there. 21 I don't think we 22 MEMBER MUNN:

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1 have done any.

2 MR. HINNEFELD: Mark, this is Stu. 3 To facilitate finding that, what's the PoC on that one? 4 5 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 11.118. б MR. HINNEFELD: I've got it. Thanks. 7 MEMBER MUNN: 204. 8 This is Mark 9 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 10 aqain. Sorry, I'm not saying my name each time. The next one I have is PoC of 11.52 and 11 it's for Hooker Electrochemical and now I 12 would ask Doug if we've done any cases from 13 this site because if we have, I would withdraw 14 15 this case? 16 MEMBER MUNN: I'm pretty sure we 17 have. MR. FARVER: You've done at least 18 19 one Hooker Electrochemical. Well, for that 20 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: reason this doesn't look that interesting if 21 we've done one case. I'll drop that one. 22

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1 And the next one I have is exactly 2 what Bob was pointing out, a PoC of 11.82, 3 Reduction Pilot Plant. MEMBER MUNN: Yes. 4 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Case 117. 5 б MEMBER MUNN: Yes. 7 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: So I am up to 30 total so far. Moving on to the next page, 8 9 the next one I have was PoC of 12.46, case 10 number 711*.* the S-50 0ak Ridqe Thermal Diffusion. I don't think we've done the S-50 11 12 facility. It's 3.7 years, but that might be 13 the whole extent of that operation. familiar 14 MEMBER MUNN: I'm not with the site. 15 16 MEMBER PRESLEY: This is Bob Presley. I don't think it was that long. 17 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I don't think 18 19 it was that long either. So yes, 3.7 years is 20 pushing it, right, Bob? 21 MEMBER PRESLEY: Yes. So this -- I 22 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON:

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1 know it's something we haven't looked at a lot. It is covered with -- it's a skin cancer 2 3 again, but it is kind of a unique facility to look at, a unique part of the K-25 complex. 4 MEMBER MUNN: Well, if we look at 5 б it as being something different than Oak 7 Ridge, all right. MR. FARVER: Mark, this is Doug. 8 9 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. 10 MR. FARVER: Going back one about the reduction pilot plant, there's also a case 11 12 to contrast the one you picked, it up just 13 over 50 percent and I don't know if you'd like to do both of those to like contrast it. 14 15 I'm trying to find the case 16 number. Alright, if you 17 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: find that. We might want to pick it to look 18 19 in our first round here. And then maybe we 20 can find out more when NIOSH pulls all the information because if they're using the same 21 exactly model, I'm not sure how much, what we 22

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1 would gain from one versus the other. But one 2 is real low and one is over 50, so --3 MR. FARVER: It's 208. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Do you have the 4 50 point what, we're all sorting by PoC right 5 б now? MR. FARVER: 50.43. 7 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Alright, 8 I'm willing to check that. I'm not sure we want 9 10 to end up with both cases, but --I thought it was 11 MR. FARVER: 12 interesting; they're both about 30 some years. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. 13 MR. FARVER: And vastly differed. 14 15 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: This is a skin. 16 It may be multiple skin cancer too. 17 MR. FARVER: I have no idea. 18 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: But anyway, 19 right. 20 MR. FARVER: Since we haven't done that site at all. 21 22 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay. I'll put

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1 that on the list for now.

2 MEMBER MUNN: So we're comparing 3 208 with which one? CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: With the last 4 one we have which is 11.82 PoC. They're just 5 б the same plant. They both had 30 some years' 7 experience, but there are different types of cancer, both at that reduction pilot plan. 8 9 MEMBER PRESLEY: Hey, Mark? 10 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, I'm not We may not including the -- keeping 11 sure. 12 that one, but -- or keeping both of those, but 13 _ _ This 14 PRESLEY: is Bob. MEMBER 15 There's one 12.7. There's been quite a few of 16 these to pop up, this Birdsboro Steel & 17 Foundry? Yes, that was 18 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 19 my next one, actually. 20 MEMBER PRESLEY: Okay. 21 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Do you agree with that? 22

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1 MEMBER PRESLEY: Yes, I don't 2 think we've done any of those at all. 3 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I don't think so either. And it may be a TBD-6000 kind of 4 5 thing, but it's worth -б MEMBER PRESLEY: Looking into. 7 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, yes. Ι agree with that, 138. And the next one I have 8 9 was the DuPont Deepwater Works, but didn't we 10 just select one of those? MEMBER MUNN: Yes, we chose one of 11 12 the higher PoCs. 13 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I think this 14 one can be dropped. The next one I have was 15 not so interesting. I'll drop that. It was 16 the very next one, 14.02, but the only 17 interest was because it was at all three, but there's a lot of people, a lot of claims of 18 19 workers that worked at all three of those 20 sites. 21 MEMBER MUNN: Yes.

22 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I'll drop that

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one. That brings me up to 33, I believe. And 1 2 I'm going on to the next one I have -- did you 3 have one? I'm sorry? MEMBER MUNN: I'm looking at 752. 4 5 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 52. б MEMBER MUNN: It's another one of 7 those, gosh, we've never done anything like 8 that? CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: What PoC is it? 9 10 MEMBER MUNN: 16.16. 11 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Oh yes, I 12 missed that one. Uranium mill. Oh, I know 13 why I sort of went over them because of the 14 limited -- it's not even a year of experience 15 there. 16 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. 17 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: So I thought we might wait on that one. 18 19 MEMBER MUNN: Okay. 20 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: The next one I have is -- the PoC is 22.28. 21 I think I get confused because Bridgeport Brass, they have 22

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an Adrian plant and they have the other plant 1 it 2 and Ι forget -- then includes this 3 extrusion plant which I think is a different place. 4 5 MEMBER MUNN: I don't know. б MR. HINNEFELD: This is Stu. 7 MEMBER MUNN: We've done several Bridgeport Brass. 8 9 MR. HINNEFELD: Bridgeport Brass, 10 there's a Bridgeport and Adrian and then there's a Bridgeport Brass, Havens Lab. 11 12 Right. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: MR. HINNEFELD: And the extrusion 13 14 plant is also a plant called Reactive Metals, 15 RMI. 16 MEMBER PRESLEY: That's what I was going to say --17 GRIFFON: 18 CHAIRMAN That's а 19 separate facility, is that right? 20 MEMBER PRESLEY: That's a total 21 separate facility because that's where I used to go up and do a lot of work. 22

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1 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: So that's why I 2 was going to select that one because we 3 haven't looked at that at all as far as I remember. 4 MEMBER PRESLEY: Yes. 5 б CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay. 7 MEMBER PRESLEY: That's a total different outfit up there. 8 9 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Alright, that 10 brings my rough count up to 34. And --MR. KATZ: Mark, what's the number 11 12 of the Bridgeport Brass case? This is Ted. 13 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I'm sorry --14 MEMBER MUNN: 525. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, case 525, 15 16 PoC 22.28. 17 The next one I have goes all the way up to -- PoC, 27.52, a different company. 18 19 That's the main reason on this one. 20 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Any others in 21 between, let me know. Here is one I picked 22

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for uranium mill in Monticello. It has four 1 2 years of experience, breast cancer, 28.65. I 3 thought that was a little, a little more work history there. 4 5 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. б MR. HINNEFELD: This is Stu. The last one you selected as for American Bearing 7 Corp., right? 8 9 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes. 10 MR. HINNEFELD: Selection 137? CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 11 Yes. 12 MEMBER PRESLEY: Hey, Mark? This PoC 26.2 is from Ames Laboratories, 13 is Bob. 14 Spencer Chemical, Jayhawk Works, Iowa National 15 Lab. Is that part of INL or is that a 16 separate facility? 17 MR. HINNEFELD: This is Stu. Towa National Lab is INL. Ames Laboratories is at 18 19 University of Iowa. 20 MEMBER PRESLEY: Okay. 21 HINNEFELD: And MR. Spencer Chemical is an AWE; it is -- I want to say 22

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1 it's in Kansas, but I won't swear that that's
2 true.

3 MEMBER PRESLEY: I don't think we
4 have done any --

5 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, we haven't 6 done Spencer Chemical.

7 MEMBER PRESLEY: That's a new 8 outfit.

9 MEMBER MUNN: But then this is 10 just another one of those cases where somebody 11 has worked many places. I don't know how much 12 it's going to tell us our Spencer Chemical or 13 Jayhawk.

14 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: True. We'd 15 have to look into Spencer Chemical by looking 16 at this person, I guess, is what Bob's point 17 is.

18 MR. HINNEFELD: Yes.

19 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: It may be that
20 he just went there for a month or something,
21 you know. We don't know.

MEMBER MUNN: Yes.

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1 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I mean I'll put 2 it on this preliminary cut through. 3 MEMBER PRESLEY: Yes. 4 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: And then, Stu, I don't know if you got that last one, 753, 5 28.65 PoC, the uranium mill one. б MR. HINNEFELD: Yes, I do have 7 that. 8 9 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay. The next 10 one I have was the International Minerals and Chemical Corp, PoC 28.74. Again, the main 11 reason was the facility. The next one I have 12 was 564, its PoC is 30.42. And this was 13 because of -- it's got the Oak Ridge Paducah 14 stuff, but also SAM Laboratories. 15 16 MEMBER PRESLEY: Yes, I've not got any problem with that. Let me ask you a 17 18 question. How many have we done on Iowa Ordnance? 19 20 MEMBER MUNN: Couple. 21 MEMBER PRESLEY: Have we? Okay. 22 MEMBER MUNN: Early on as Ι

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1 recall.

2	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, yes. I
3	think we did do a couple of that, yes.
4	Alright, and the next one I have
5	is well, this gets a little out of the
6	unique site stuff now because we're getting a
7	little higher with the PoC, 32.14 PoC. It's
8	Los Alamos. And a lot of years of experience
9	starting in the '50s. I thought that was
10	worth looking at anyway.
11	Next one I have was two down from
12	that, Savannah River, nervous system. A
13	little different organ of interest. Thirty-
14	eight years work there. Case 572.
15	The next one I have was 642, which
16	is PoC 33.65, esophagus at Mound, 30 years of
17	experience, 1960. Unique for the work history
18	anyway.
19	My rough count, I may be off by a
20	few right now, I think I'm up to 38 on my
21	cases.
22	MEMBER MUNN: We're getting pretty

1 close.

2	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes.
3	MEMBER PRESLEY: Mark, let me ask
4	you something?
5	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Go ahead.
6	MEMBER PRESLEY: How many of the
7	Mallinckrodt at Destrehan Street in Weldon
8	Springs have we done? I know we've done a
9	few, but it looks like that's going to crop
10	back up on our chart here.
11	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I don't
12	remember actually doing many.
13	MEMBER PRESLEY: Three's a 38.363
14	which is bladder, ten years, early on. And he
15	said he worked both those places; bladder and
16	genitalia.
17	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 38.363.
18	MEMBER PRESLEY: Yes.
19	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay. I think
20	even more interesting is, I don't think we've
21	done any at the Destrehan Street Plant. So
22	yes, we'll check that off. That's 38.363,

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1 case number 396.

2 MEMBER MUNN: Even though it's 3 skin, number 374. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: What's the PoC, 4 5 Wanda? б MEMBER MUNN: 3694. Okay. 7 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: MEMBER PRESLEY: Pacific Proving 8 Grounds? 9 10 MEMBER MUNN: Yes. 11 MEMBER PRESLEY: We haven't done 12 anything on that, have we? MEMBER MUNN: Short period, but I 13 don't think we've looked at it. 14 15 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, very short 16 period, but I don't think we looked at it. 17 Okay, let's add that one. And the last one I have was PoC 18 19 39.379 which was the Savannah River. It's a 20 lung and all male genitalia, 33 years. That was all I had. That actually brings us right 21 up to 40. 22

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1 MEMBER PRESLEY: I got one more. 2 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay. 3 MEMBER PRESLEY: PoC of 41.92, W.R. Grace. 4 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I didn't get 5 б that one. MEMBER MUNN: 41.92. 7 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I got that one 8 already. 9 10 MEMBER PRESLEY: We qot it on there? All right. 11 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I did not even 12 look at the random list. If you want to take 13 a minute and look at the random list. 14 The other thing -- we can do this 15 16 when we get all these -- when NIOSH gives us the additional information on this. 17 The one thing I'm going to pay attention to for our 18 19 final selection is the date that they were done because I know that that's one criteria. 20 Wanda, you talked about some of the material. 21 Now if it's a unique site, it may 22

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not matter that much, a site that we've never looked at before, but if it's things like Savannah River, we want to get more current cases because we want to see if -- we don't want to review the same findings again, basically.

No.

7 MEMBER MUNN:

8 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: We want to get 9 the more current dose rate constructions where 10 we can, but that's something I will pay 11 attention a little more in the next -- as we 12 look through the next round.

13 MEMBER MUNN: That's wise.

14 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Does anyone15 have any more on this list?

MEMBER PRESLEY: I'm looking at one at the random list. This is Bob. And it's 016 and it's the Clarksville facility. It's got quite a few years.

20 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Four and a half 21 years. We can certainly --

22 MEMBER PRESLEY: I don't know if

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1 that place was in existence or not, but maybe 2 it was.

3 MEMBER MUNN: That's new. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Let's add that 4 the list. So that's -- Stu, you 5 on to б tracking these too. I'll send you my list. MR. HINNEFELD: Okay, just send me 7 your list today or early tomorrow. 8 That's all I've 9 MEMBER PRESLEY: 10 got. 11 MR. HINNEFELD: Sent it to Brant, 12 too, if you will, please. 13 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I will, I will. 14 MR. HINNEFELD: Okay. 15 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: And I'm just 16 looking through the random list really quick one more time, just to take a couple of 17 minutes if anybody else has 18 any others. 19 Sometimes these overlap too, as we know. 20 I think that Alcoa lung case is the same one we just picked. 21 MEMBER MUNN: Yes, probably, yes. 22

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1 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: There is а 2 Stanford Linear Accelerator Center. I'm on 3 the last page which I'm pretty sure we never looked at that. 4 MEMBER PRESLEY: Probably haven't. 5 6 We did a lot of research over there. Yes. I think I 7 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: want to add that one on there if that's okay. 8 9 MEMBER MUNN: 036, right? 10 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, case number 036, yes, the last page. And that's 11 all I have. 12 13 MEMBER PRESLEY: This is Bob. Т didn't see anything else. 14 15 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay. John, 16 any others that you had? 17 MR. POSTON: I'm fine. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 18 Okay. What I 19 can do also is I'll send out all the -- to Stu Brant, but also to everyone 20 and on the Committee just to make sure I didn't, you 21 22 know, mess up on my notes here, but I'll send

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1 out and I'll put the three digits to the left, 2 three digits of the case number so if you look 3 through there and see something that -- or something missing, just ship me an email and 4 this is our preliminary cut, so it doesn't 5 б really matter if we add one or two more. 7 But I think we're like 42, Stu, so that should be a reasonable number for you 8 9 guys to manage and we can still hopefully get 10 around 30 cases for SC&A. I think we're all 11 set. 12 MEMBER MUNN: Great. If you'll do

13 all the work, that's super.

14CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, well, this15is not that much work. So I can handle this.16MEMBER MUNN: You and Stu do all

17 the work.

CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 18 Yes. NIOSH can 19 do all the work they are going to pull all the 20 cases, that's the hard part. Okay, that's it. 21 That's of our shortest one Dose Reconstruction Subcommittee meetings ever. 22

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1 MR. KATZ: Mark, can you hear me? CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: 2 Yes. 3 MR. KATZ: This is Ted. I just want to be clear about the path going forward. 4 Did I understand correctly what you said in 5 б the beginning, or Stu, that these cases would 7 not be ready for the May Board Meeting for Board selection but a teleconference following 8 that meeting? 9 10 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, Ι was being overly ambitious and we scheduled this 11 too close to the full Board meeting for that 12 13 to be a reality, because NIOSH has to open up each one of these cases to find out that 14 additional information that we want and to 15 16 open and go through each case in the short amount of time is not realistic. 17 So yeah, we'll have to wait until 18 19 our next phone Board meeting to do the final selection. 20

21 MR. KATZ: Okay, I just wanted to 22 be clear because we had it tentatively on the

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1 agenda for the working time at the Board 2 meeting, so --

3 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: I think we'll stick with our process though. 4 That was my 5 hope to try to get that in, but -- yes. б MR. HINNEFELD: This is Stu. What 7 will happen the next step is that either Brant or I will send to all the Subcommittee Members 8 and to Doug the cases that were selected 9 10 today, along with another five or six columns of additional information, once we've opened 11 12 up the claims and populated those fields. So those will be available to the 13 Subcommittee. 14 Or if it's preferred, I can send 15 16 it to the entire Board, however. CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Yes, I think we 17 should probably do it to the entire Board at 18 19 this point. 20 MR. HINNEFELD: Okay.

21 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: You can say 22 these are the cases that the Subcommittee

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1 preselected.

2	MR. HINNEFELD: Preliminarily
3	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: additional
4	information on those cases.
5	MR. HINNEFELD: Okay. And I'll
6	sort of I can run the discussion on that
7	and explain what we did in the first round,
8	but then I don't think we need that middle
9	step of having us come back together again
10	with the additional information and then
11	bringing it back to the Board. Let's just go
12	right to the full Board at this point on a
13	phone meeting.
14	MEMBER PRESLEY: Well, either that
15	or Stu, did you say there's no way in the
16	world that you can get anything ready like
17	that?
18	MR. HINNEFELD: For next week, not
19	a chance, Bob.
20	MEMBER PRESLEY: All right.
21	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Just the way
22	the schedule worked out, we couldn't get a
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meeting set before this because of all the
 other meetings. So, yes.

3 MEMBER MUNN: There's too much4 going on.

5 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: We'll proceed 6 as fast as we can.

7 MR. HINNEFELD: And everybody, I would like everybody to recognize that the 8 9 people who are going to have to open these cases and look at them and pick these -- find 10 that additional piece of information have to 11 12 be relatively experienced dose reconstructors and we're now in our last three weeks of 13 14 trying to meet our June 1st deadline for the 15 old claims. So we're going to be putting 16 experienced dose reconstructors this, on unless they're conflicted on all the remaining 17 June 1st claims. 18

MEMBER PRESLEY: No problem.
CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Alright, that's
our path forward and we'll bring the full list
to the next phone meeting of the Board and go

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from there. 1 Thank you all. I think we're all 2 3 set here.
