

Yinka Kerr earned her MSPH in Health Policy and Administration from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1997. After completing her Master's, she started with CDC in the Public Health Prevention Service (PHPS). She completed her PHPS assignments in the Epidemiology and Surveillance Branch, Division of STD Prevention for 6 month assignment, Vaccine Preventable Disease Eradication Division, National Immunization Program for 6 month assignment, and the Communicable Disease Control Services, Department of Health, St. Louis County, Missouri for the two year assignment.

From 2001 – 2006, she worked at the WHO African Regional Office in Harare, Zimbabwe as a Technical Officer where her main responsibilities were in administration and finance for the regional polio eradication program. Prior to graduate school, she was a Peace Corps volunteer for 3.5 years in Thailand and has also lived in Afghanistan and Egypt.

Since 2007, she is the Stop Transmission of Polio (STOP) team lead in the Global Immunization Division. The STOP program sends participants overseas for three – five month assignment to work on polio eradication and measles elimination. The STOP program is implemented twice a year.
