Illinois Health & Hazardous Substances Registry Act (1984)

- "...purpose...to establish a unified Statewide project to collect, compile, and correlate information on public health and hazardous substances."
- "...in such a manner as to allow for geographical correlation of the data..."
- "...shall be compatible with other national models...."

Proposed Amendment

Expand the categories of information compiled in the Registry

- 1. Environmental Hazards
- 2. Environmental Exposures
- 3. Environmentally Related Diseases
- 4. Health Effects Potentially Related to Environmental Hazards & Exposures
