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# What is the National Death Index?

- It is a database of ALL deaths in the United States.
- It currently spans 1979 to 2011
- It is culled only from state death certificates. No other sources.
- It includes the 50 states, NYC, DC, Puerto Rico, and the USVI.

## What data is in the NDI?

- There are over 70 million records in the NDI. Approximately 2.5 million records are added annually.
- It includes first/MI/last names, father's surname (if female), SSN, month/day/year of birth, age, sex, race, marital status, state of residence, state of birth.

## NDI data cont.

- The NDI provides clients with date and state of death, the death certificate number, and cause of death.
- Cause of death includes the underlying cause of death plus the multiple cause of death codes (up to 20).
- ICD9 or ICD10 coding (date dependent).

## **Main restriction to NDI use**

- **It can only be used for health and medical research and purposes.**
- **No administrative or legal purposes.**
- **The data are highly confidential, and may not be re-released without stripping all identifiable information, nor without written permission from the NDI.**

# Suicides in the Military

- In recent years, there has been a lot of media attention focused on suicides in the military
- This attention has resulted in several Congressional inquiries into the problem.
- Both DoD and VA have been ordered to assess the magnitude of the problem and reduce the numbers of active duty and veteran deaths due to suicide.

# DoD and VA history with the NDI

- Since 1983 we have had about 64-65 VA studies and 18-20 DoD studies which have matched to the NDI.
- About 7 of these have focused on suicides among military personnel.
- In particular, the VA has been studying suicides for several years.

# DoD/VA Mortality Data Repository

- Recognition in the military that a coordinated effort was needed.
- Past experience with the NDI raised awareness that we were the source of information they needed.
- A joint project would also eliminate redundancy in other areas of DoD/VA health research.

# **DoD/VA Mortality Data Repository cont.**

- **A combined file of all DoD and VA records matched against the NDI**
- **Altogether around 26,042,159 military records, on 53 discs.**
- **Just completed and mailed back to them last week.**

## How will the data be used?

- DoD/VA will set up their own linked database and Governing Council to review all internal research requests for the data.
- Eventually, outside researchers may also gain access, but with a joint review process with NDI Advisors.
- Initial emphasis on suicide research, but over time many other health research topics will be examined.

## **NCHS benefits as well**

- **Flag our mortality records with veteran status, after DoD/VA identify all their “true” matches**
  - **This will permit aggregate statistical analyses using veteran status, that we have not been able to do.**
  - **This will also allow similar analyses from the public mortality files.**

## Benefits, cont.

- DoD/VA will send us their out-of-country death records, going back to the Korean War.
- They will thereafter send us these records on a monthly basis.
- For a long time we have sought to acquire these records.
  - These records will complete our mortality files.
  - They will be used only for statistical purposes.

## Benefit for the states

- This death information will aid the states in flagging birth records as deceased (process yet to be determined).
- This will prevent fraud and abuse (e.g. identity theft) of government records.
- This information will only be used for statistical purposes.
- The DoD/VA records will not be retained by the states.
