

- National Health Interview Survey (NHIS)
- Medical Expenditures Panel Survey (MEPS)
- Current Population Survey (CPS)
- Survey of Income & Program Participation (SIPP)
- American Community Survey (ACS) insurance question proposed

Factors Contributing to Different Estimates of the Uninsured

- Sample design
- Survey mode
- Response rates
- Underlying focus of the survey
- Reference periods
- Question structure and wording
- Edits

ASPE's Concerns About Differing Estimates of the Uninsured

- Confusion of policymakers and the public
- Potential methodological flaws
- Appropriate differences, and what they can teach us
- Research strategies for understanding factors driving differences

NCHS Research Proposal to ASPE (1) Record Linkage Strategies

- Analyze linked NHIS/MEPS files to compare:
 - Health insurance responses
 - Income measures
- Link NHIS to Medicaid administrative records

NCHS Research Proposal to ASPE (2) Insurance Questions

 Ask CPS insurance questions on non-MEPS half of NHIS

 Ask ACS insurance questions on non-MEPS half of NHIS

• Conduct meta review of cognitive evaluations of insurance questions
