
#### Obesity

Figure 6.1. Prevalence of obesity among adults aged 20 and over: United States, 1997–2016



The analyses excluded people with unknown height or weight (about 6% of respondents each year). See Technical Notes for more details.

- For 2016, 30.6% (95% confidence interval = 29.77%–31.37%) of U.S. adults aged 20 and over were obese. This was not significantly different from the 2015 estimate of 30.4%.
- The prevalence of obesity among U.S. adults aged 20 and over increased, from 19.4% in 1997 to 30.6% in 2016.

Figure 6.2. Prevalence of obesity among adults aged 20 and over, by age group and sex: United States, 2016



- For both sexes combined, the prevalence of obesity was higher among adults aged 40–59 (34.7%), compared with adults aged 60 and over (29.2%) and those aged 20–39 (27.7%). This pattern held for males and females.
- There was no significant difference in the prevalence of obesity between men and women in any age group.

- Non-Hispanic black women (46.7%) were most likely to be obese, compared with Hispanic women (32.2%) and non-Hispanic white women (28.4%).
- Non-Hispanic black men (34.0%) were more likely to be obese, compared with non-Hispanic white men (30.2%).
- There was no significant difference in the prevalence of obesity among Hispanic men (32.2%) compared with non-Hispanic black men and non-Hispanic white men.
