



## OUTPATIENT PROCEDURE COMPONENT (OPC) AND NEONATAL COMPONENT WD4165

**PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:** This educational activity is designed to introduce healthcare personnel to two new National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN) components – the Outpatient Procedure Component and the Neonatal Component and explain how these new surveillance protocols are used on infection prevention and control.

4. Describe the reporting structure of the SDOM and SSI modules
5. Describe the rationale and background for Late Onset Sepsis and Meningitis (LOS/MEN) within the Neonatal Component
6. Define the National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN) criteria for LOS/MEN
7. Describe the importance of interprofessional collaboration in healthcare-associated infection surveillance and reporting
