CDC to Host Field Staff Expansion Meeting on April 16

CDC will conduct an informational meeting from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. EDT on Friday, April 16, with PHEP directors and state epidemiologists to discuss the expansion of its Career Epidemiology Field Officer (CEFO) program. CDC plans to create a national CEFO network that will support the emergency preparedness and response activities of every state, territory, and locality directly funded by the PHEP cooperative agreement. Beginning in July 2021, CDC will provide centralized PHEP funding to support one existing CEFO in each state or city. Concurrently, CDC will assess the interest and begin the process of developing CEFO assignments in the remaining 29 states, Los Angeles County, and Washington, D.C. When fully implemented, the national network will include 56 CEFOs directly funded by CDC.

CDC Awards \$3 Billion to Expand COVID-19 Vaccine Programs

CDC announced April 6 that it has awarded funding to support local efforts to increase vaccine uptake by expanding COVID-19 vaccine programs and ensuring greater equity and access to vaccine by those disproportionately affected by SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19. The awards are part of \$3 billion in funding that CDC has granted to 64 jurisdictions to bolster broad-based vaccine distribution, access, and administration efforts. The funding was made available by the American Rescue Plan and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act and will provide critical support through CDC's existing immunization cooperative agreements in communities around the country

To ensure health equity and expanded access to COVID-19 vaccines:

- 75% of the total funding must focus on specific programs and initiatives intended to increase vaccine access, acceptance, and uptake among racial and ethnic minority communities; and,
- 60% must go to support local health departments, community-based organizations, and community health centers.

CDC Launches COVID-19 Vaccine Community Features

In the last several months, public health officials and partners across the country planned and launched the largest vaccination program in 60 years to fight the largest pandemic in more than 100 years. Vaccinating millions of people each day does not happen by accident. It takes people, planning, creativity, persistence, and just hard work. While the COVID-19 vaccination program is still in the early stages, CDC wants to look beyond the numbers to highlight the programs and the people that are the root of this historic effort.

CDC has launched the <u>COVID-19 Vaccine Community Features</u> site to help public health departments tell their stories. In addition to the site, CDC will promote features across CDC social media channels and use the stories in presentations to partners and internally.

Each week, CDC plans to highlight stories of innovation and proven public health practice to document and share the work health departments and partners are doing to increase vaccination access in their communities. While each community is unique, all face many of the same challenges. By sharing these stories, public health departments may help other colleagues across the country improve their vaccination programs.

CDC Updates Strategies for Optimizing N95 Respirator Supply

On April 9, CDC updated its <u>recommended strategies for optimizing the supply of disposable N95 respirators</u> in healthcare settings when there is limited supply. CDC strategies include contingency and crisis capacity measures that augment conventional capacity measures and are meant to be considered and **implemented sequentially**. Once N95 respirator availability returns to normal, healthcare facilities should promptly resume conventional practices.

The most recent CDC updates acknowledged that the supply and availability of respirators approved by CDC's National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) have increased significantly over the last several months. The NIOSH Certified Equipment List identifies all NIOSH-approved respirators and approval holders.

CDC Mental Health Survey Extended to April 16

CDC has developed a survey for **ALL** U.S. public health workers to better understand and address the mental health impact and support needs for these crucial workers who have been responding to the COVID-19 pandemic. The survey is intended for full-time and part-time employees, contractors, fellows, and others who worked in state, tribal, local, and territorial public health departments in 2020 and will look at demographics, job categories, and questions to assess symptoms of anxiety, depression, and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). All survey responses are **anonymous**, and no personal identifiers will be collected. Participation is completely voluntary, and participants may withdraw from the survey at any time. CDC has extended the survey deadline; **the survey link will remain open until 11:59 p.m. EDT on Friday, April 16. Please share widely with staff at all levels and functions of your health department.**
