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

CDC Provides Guidance on CEFO Salary Costs

CDC recently announced it planned to shift from direct assistance (DA) to central funding to support one Career Epidemiology Officer (CEFO) in each PHEP jurisdiction that currently has a CEFO assignee. This change is effective July 1. Since salaries must be paid from current fiscal year 2021 funds, recipients that currently have CEFOs should note that their PHEP Budget Period 3 (BP3) Notices of Award (NOAs) will reflect DA costs for nine months of the fiscal year, October 1, 2020, to June 30, 2021. Recipients' BP3 budget

planning numbers posted in January, before the national CEFO network proposal was fully approved, were based on a full 12 months of DA costs. However, with the change in how CEFOs are funded, recipients will see in their NOAs an approximately 25% reduction in their DA costs for the last three months of the current fiscal year. Jurisdictions that have additional CEFOs will continue to pay DA for the entire fiscal year. Jurisdictions with questions regarding these changes should contact their PHEP project officers.



OMB Issues Additional COVID-19 Flexibilities for Recipients of Federal Grants

CDC's Office of Grants Services (OGS) has released new grant notes in GrantSolutions for PHEP and Crisis Response cooperative agreement recipients regarding prior approval flexibilities during the ongoing COVID-19 emergency response. The new grant notes are in response to changes announced March 19 by the Office of Management and Budget in its Memorandum M021-20. The memorandum identifies flexibilities to help manage administrative, financial management, and audit requirements under 2 CFR Part 200. CDC's implementation of these flexibilities is outlined in its Flexibilities Guidance for Applicants and Recipients of Federal Financial Assistance Affected by COVID-19 on the CDC website. Recipients should direct prior approval questions to their assigned project officers and grants management specialists.

New Infographic Now Available on How to Access GSA COVID-19 Response Support Services

The COVID-19 response has put extraordinary stress on available physical resources, including staff, supplies, equipment, and supportive services. To mitigate this, the General Services Administration (GSA) completed a COVID-19 response support package that enables state, tribal, local, and territorial health departments to enter into contracts with vendors for surge staffing and other needs. GSA has identified more than 120 vendors that can provide COVID-19 support services covering all regions of the country, tribes, territories, and freely associated states. A new infographic now available on the CDC website describes the steps needed to access GSA services.

FDA and CDC Lift Recommended Pause on Johnson & Johnson (Janssen) COVID-19 Vaccine Use Following a thorough safety review, CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP), and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) have determined that the recommended pause regarding the use of the Janssen (Johnson & Johnson) COVID-19 Vaccine in the United States should be lifted and use of the vaccine should resume. CDC Releases Resources for Contact Tracing in Schools and Operating Summer Camps

CDC recently released two guidance documents addressing youth and summer camps and case investigation and contact tracing in K-12 schools and institutions of higher education.

- The <u>Guidance for Operating Youth and Summer Camps During COVID-19</u> is intended for all types of
 youth day camps with additional guidance provided for overnight camps. The guidance outlines
 strategies that camp programs can use to maintain healthy environments and operations, lower the risk
 of COVID-19 spread in their programs, prepare for when someone is sick with COVID-19, and support
 coping and resilience.
- Considerations for Case Investigation and Contact Tracing in K-12 Schools and Institutions of Higher Education (IHEs) provides updated guidance to administrators of K-12 schools, IHEs, and health officials on how to prepare and implement COVID-19 case investigation and contact tracing efforts in educational settings. The guidance consolidates two previously published documents and highlights the importance of a well-coordinated effort between K-12 schools/IHEs and health officials. It is meant to supplement—not replace—any federal, state, tribal, local, or territorial privacy or public health and safety laws, rules, and regulations with which K-12 schools and IHEs must comply. This guidance addresses implications of updated information on identifying close contacts, testing for COVID-19, vaccination, mask use, isolation, and guarantine for K-12 school and IHE settings.

CDC Updates Guidance for Fully Vaccinated People, Healthcare Settings

CDC has released updated information for fully vaccinated people and for healthcare settings following COVID-19 vaccination. The Interim Public Health Recommendations for Fully Vaccinated People (Nonhealthcare settings), released on April 27, updates the recommendations for fully vaccinated people to incorporate the most recent studies and policies. Guiding principles for fully vaccinated people are now provided, along with updates to quarantine, isolation, and testing recommendations.

CDC's <u>Updated Healthcare Infection Prevention and Control Recommendations in Response to COVID-19</u>
<u>Vaccination</u> includes changes to select healthcare infection prevention and control recommendations for healthcare workers. Located on CDC's <u>Infection Control website</u>, the updates include SARS-CoV-2 testing recommendations, visitation guidance for acute care facilities, and additional guidance for communal activities and dining in healthcare settings.

An additional resource is CDC's <u>When You've Been Fully Vaccinated</u> web page, which provides guidance and tips for what individuals can do when fully vaccinated. This information includes the most recent updates and recommendations for travel, mask wearing, and what to do when exposed to someone with COVID-19.
