CDC Launches New COVID-19 Vaccine Online Tool

CDC has launched the <u>SmartFind COVID-19 Vaccine ChatBot</u> tool to help provide clear, consistent, and credible information about COVID-19 vaccines, including answers to common COVID-19 vaccination questions. This new tool, tailored to both health care providers and the general public, can quickly connect visitors with up-to-date information and resources about COVID-19 vaccines, enabling them to make informed choices about COVID-19 vaccination.

The automated chatbot features include:

- Answers to common questions about COVID-19 vaccines that are authorized and recommended or those undergoing large-scale (Phase 3) clinical trials in the United States;
- 24/7 access to COVID-19 vaccine information on web-based devices, including mobile phones and tablets; and
- Links to additional resources, such as where to find COVID-19 vaccination locations.

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CDC to Host September 14 Webinar on Equity and Policy Preparedness

CDC, in conjunction with the National Governors Association (NGA) and the American Bar Association (ABA), will conduct a webinar on "What's New: Equity and Policy Preparedness during Public Health Emergencies" from **1 p.m. to 2 p.m. EDT on Tuesday, September 14**. This webinar is an update to the <u>2020 series of public</u> <u>health equity webinars</u> hosted by CDC, ABA, and NGA to help ensure the equitable execution of future public health emergency response and recovery efforts.

Aimed at preparedness and response professionals, the September 14 webinar will focus on how states and territories can better serve disproportionately affected groups at higher risk of adverse outcomes through the end of the COVID-19 response and future public health emergencies. Specifically, presenters from CDC, ABA, Association of State and Territorial Health Officials, and the state of Maryland will discuss how to leverage lessons learned from efforts to meet the needs of disproportionally affected groups in 2020, to identify persistent barriers, and to identify promising practices for jurisdictions seeking to address longstanding public health equity issues.

CDC also plans to publish a series of stories authored by graduate students at Northwestern University in its <u>Public Health Matters blog</u> in support of its National Preparedness Month theme. The stories relate real examples of preparedness and response obstacles experienced by disproportionately affected communities, including people experiencing homelessness and people who are unable to leave their homes.

Upcoming EPA Webinar to Discuss Water-related Laboratory Response Issues

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has scheduled a tabletop exercise (TTX) webinar from **1 p.m. to 3 p.m. EDT on Thursday, September 16,** to address responses to water contamination incidents. The scenario-based TTX is designed to help utility companies, state and local governments, emergency responders and laboratory personnel learn about key elements of EPA's water laboratory alliance response plan, which provides a national approach to coordinated laboratory response incidents requiring more analytical support than a typical utility or state laboratory can provide. The TTX will cover best practices for emergency response; roles that laboratories and others would play during a response to a water contamination incident; and EPA water security tools and resources. CDC and AmeriCorps Launch New Partnership to Develop Public Health Leaders

CDC and AmeriCorps, the federal agency for volunteering and national service, has launched <u>Public Health</u> <u>AmeriCorps</u>, a new partnership to support recruitment, training, and development of a new generation of public health leaders who will be ready to respond to the nation's public health needs. The program is anticipated to fund up to 5,000 AmeriCorps positions over the next five years and comes as part of a larger <u>\$7 billion</u> <u>investment</u> in the public health workforce funded by the American Rescue Plan.

CDC and AmeriCorps also released a <u>notice of federal funding opportunity</u> open to nonprofit, faith-based, and community-based organizations; higher-education institutions; state, local, and territorial government entities, such as cities or counties; and tribal entities. Potential applicant organizations are encouraged to fully review the information posted on the <u>State and National Public Health AmeriCorps page</u>. The application deadline is **Monday, November 8**.

AmeriCorps will host a variety of technical assistance calls, webinars, and workshops to answer questions about this funding opportunity. FEMA Announces Funding Opportunity for COVID-19 Testing

On August 28, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced a funding opportunity available to local, state, tribal, and territorial governments and eligible nonprofit organizations carrying out COVID-19 testing activities. FEMA will fund testing to detect COVID-19 infections both in a medical setting and testing needed to safely open and operate public facilities, including schools. Funding may be used to support

both diagnostic and screening protocols. In general, FEMA will fund <u>diagnostic and screening testing</u> to determine if an active coronavirus infection is present and if an individual should take steps to quarantine or isolate from others.

This funding can include costs for:

- Laboratory testing materials and test kits including antigen self-tests;
- Contracting for testing support by a third party;
- Staffing to administer tests;
- Training for individuals to administer tests;
- Signage and other communication materials;
- · Personal protective equipment and other administrative supplies to conduct testing; and,
- Technology to register and track testing results.
