PHEP Cooperative Agreement Updates

New Ready CAMP Platform to Consolidate DSLR IT Systems

CDC has launched the development of a new information technology (IT) platform to improve how it collects, analyzes, and uses PHEP and Public Health Crisis Response (PHCR) cooperative agreement program data. CDC plans to implement Ready CAMP, a DSLR-specific version of the Salesforce application known as Cooperative Agreement Management Platform (CAMP). Similar program management applications are currently used by CDC's Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity (ELC) program and the Public Health Infrastructure Center


When fully implemented, Ready CAMP will consolidate the functions of several IT systems currently used by DSLR and recipients:

- PERFORMS (Preparedness Emergency Response System for Oversight, Reporting and Management Services),
- PORTS (PHEP Operational Readiness Review Reporting and Tracking System),
- On-TAPP (Online Technical Assistance Application),
- On-TRAC (Online Technical Resource and Assistance Center),
- REDCap (Research Electronic Data Capture), and
- STLT Hub (State, Tribal, Local, and Territorial Support Task Force).

CDC intends to have the initial phases of the new platform operational in the first quarter of 2024 to assist recipients with developing their PHEP funding applications for the first budget period of the new five-year period of performance. Full implementation of the IT system is scheduled to be completed by the end 2024.

NRC-RIM Offers Technical Assistance Resources for State and Local Health Departments

The National Resource Center for Refugees, Immigrants, and Migrants (NRC-RIM) is funded by CDC and the International Organization for Migration to support health departments and community organizations working with <u>refugee</u>, <u>immigrant</u>, <u>and migrant</u> (RIM) <u>communities</u> that have been disproportionately affected by health inequities. Initially established in October 2020 as part of the nation's COVID-19 response, NRC-RIM now focuses on public health preparedness and other needs of new arrival communities.

Core NRC-RIM activities include:

- Collecting, developing, and disseminating best and promising practices,
- Creating guides and checklists that are practical, step-by-step resources designed for public health professionals and others,
- Developing and disseminating linguistically and culturally appropriate health communications and health education resources,
- Creating online training and other resources for public health professionals working with RIM communities,
- Supporting pilot projects between health departments and community-based organizations serving RIM communities, and
- Providing direct support to state and local health departments through technical assistance requests.

CDC Provides Interim Recommendations to Protect Infants from RSV

On October 23, CDC issued a <u>health advisory</u> to provide options for clinicians to protect infants from respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) in the context of a <u>limited supply of nirsevimab</u>. Nirsevimab is a long-acting monoclonal antibody immunization product recommended for preventing RSV-associated lower respiratory tract disease in infants.



In the context of limited supply during the 2023–2024 RSV season, CDC recommends prioritizing available nirsevimab 100mg doses for infants at the highest risk for severe RSV disease: young infants (ages less than six months) and infants with underlying conditions that place them at highest risk for severe RSV disease. Recommendations for using 50mg doses remain unchanged at this time.
