Ready CAMP to Launch New Features in April In April 4, CDC's Ready CAMP is scheduled to launch a new feature that will enable PHEP recipients to copy their Budget Period 1 (BP1) work plan and budget workbook information to future budget periods. After they copy their BP1 information into Budget Periods 2-5 workbooks, recipients can edit and update information as needed. The April 4 update will also include a report generation feature. With this new feature, recipients will be able to generate work plan and budget workbook reports that they can download and print.

CDC plans to conduct a series of Ready CAMP office hours soon and will notify recipients once details are finalized.

April 10 PHEP Connects Webinar Addresses Targeted Violence Prevention for Health Care and Public Health Communities



Security experts from the <u>Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security</u> <u>Agency (CISA)</u> will share their insights on conflict prevention



strategies and considerations to enhance safety and security and increase personal resilience in health care and public health communities. Speakers will also introduce tangible ways to identify and mitigate incidents of targeted violence. Participants will learn to recognize the warning signs of someone on a path to violence and the actions that security and other staff can take to prevent a potential incident of violence before it materializes. CDC Issues Health Advisory on Increase in Global and Domestic Measles Cases and Outbreaks

On March 18, CDC issued a Health Alert Network (HAN) <u>health advisory</u> to inform clinicians and public health officials of an increase in global and U.S. measles cases. This HAN also provides guidance on measles prevention for all international travelers ages six months and older and all children ages 12 months and older who do not plan to travel internationally.



From January 1 to March 14, CDC has been notified of 58 confirmed U.S. <u>cases of measles</u> across 17 jurisdictions, including seven outbreaks in seven jurisdictions compared with 58 total cases and four outbreaks reported the entire year in 2023. Among the 58 cases reported in 2024, 54 (93%) were linked to international travel. Most cases reported in 2024 have been among children ages 12 months and older who had not received measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine. Many countries, including travel destinations such as Austria, the Philippines, Romania, and the United Kingdom, are experiencing measles outbreaks.

To prevent measles infection and reduce the risk of community transmission from importation, all U.S. residents traveling internationally, regardless of destination, should be current on their MMR vaccinations. Health care providers should ensure children are current on routine immunizations, including MMR. Given currently high population immunity against measles in most U.S. communities, the risk of widescale spread is low. However, pockets of low coverage leave some communities at higher risk for outbreaks.

ACIP Recommends That Older Adults Receive Additional Dose of Updated COVID-19 Vaccine

The CDC Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices' (ACIP) recommends adults ages 65 years and older receive an additional updated 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine dose. The recommendation acknowledges the increased risk of severe disease from COVID-19 in older adults, along with the currently available data on vaccine effectiveness. Data continues to show the importance of vaccination to protect those most at risk for severe outcomes of COVID-19.
