We have just wrapped up day one of our first-ever virtual <u>STD Prevention Conference</u>. I am excited and pleased to share a couple of high points from the first day and a few items to look forward to as the conference continues.

We began with a pre-conference roundtable for journalists, in which myself, Drs. Hillard Weinstock (CDC) and Hilary Reno (Washington University in St. Louis and the St. Louis County Sexual Health Clinics and a CDC medical consultant), as well as NCSD's David Harvey, shared thoughts and data related to the impact COVID-19 has had on STD prevention. We also talked about the course we will chart forward together, as we adapt to the rapidly changing healthcare landscape and find novel ways of working during the pandemic and beyond. Then the conference officially kicked off with Racism as a Public Health Issue. In that humbling and frank panel discussion, Drs. Aletha Maybank and Leandro Mena walked us through the finer points of navigating racism through organizational culture change and in our work. The speakers underscored that if we truly want to address racism in a meaningful way, we must honestly examine the history of racism within our institutions and explore our own biases and blind spots. Importantly, they reminded us that health equity is not an after-thought; it thrives when it's woven into the fabric of an institution.

Following that, the COVID-19 and STI Prevention panel discussion expanded on the earlier conversation with journalists and highlighted some of the innovative, "boots on the ground" work our colleagues have been doing since COVID struck. Finally, in what will come as a surprise to no one, the dynamic, Dr. David Malebranche gave us a lot to consider when thinking about systemic and institutional barriers to our prevention work.

In a mixture of live and pre-taped sessions, the remainder of the conference will dive into even more. It's not too late to <u>register</u>! After registering, you can catch up on the conference sessions you missed today and not miss a second of the rest of the action.
