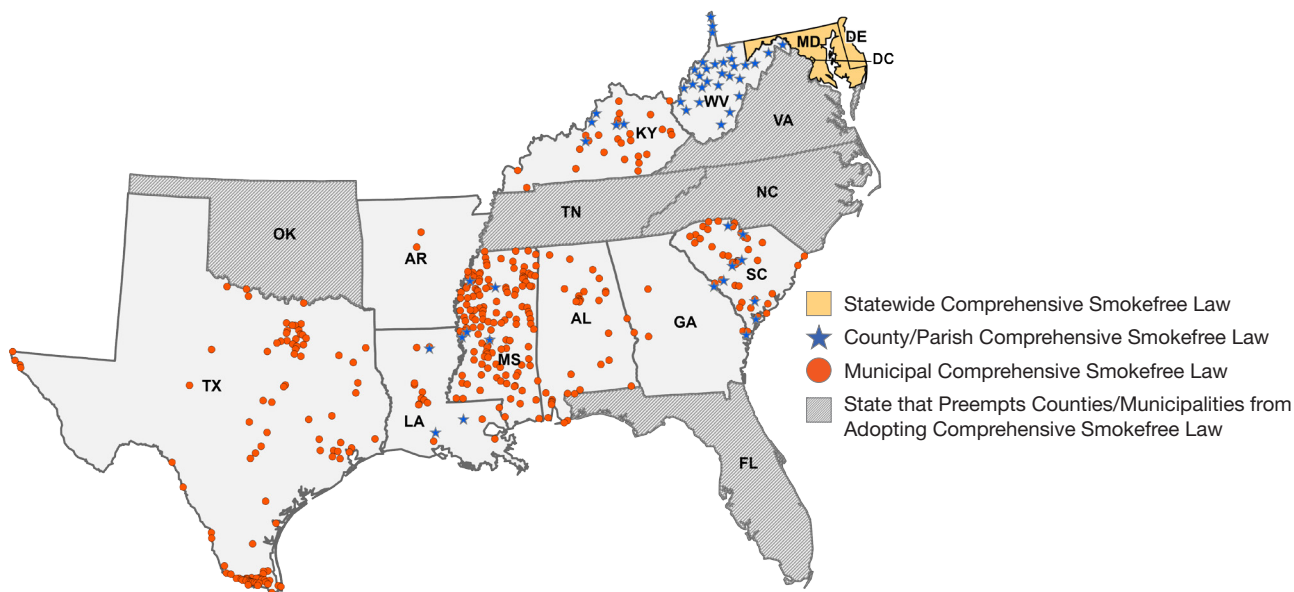


# Smokefree Protection in the South: Is Your Community Smokefree?

## A Comprehensive Smokefree Law Prohibits Smoking in ALL Indoor Areas of Private Worksites, Restaurants, and Bars

Policies in effect as of April 1, 2019



### No Level of Secondhand Smoke Exposure is Safe

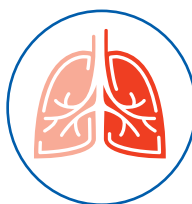


Secondhand smoke kills more than **400 infants and 41,000 adult nonsmokers<sup>1</sup>** every year in the U.S.

<sup>1</sup>Infant deaths include those due to Sudden Infant Death Syndrome. Deaths among nonsmoking adults include those due to lung cancer and heart disease.



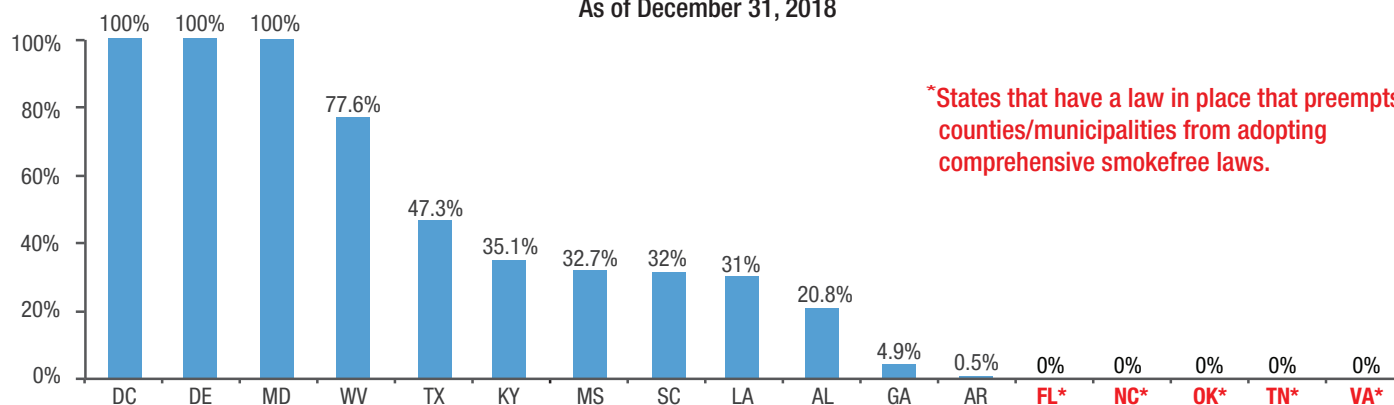
Smokefree policies are proven ways to protect nonsmokers from the harms of secondhand smoke exposure.



58 million U.S. nonsmokers are still exposed to secondhand smoke.
