



CDC Childhood Immunization Champion Award **Scoring Template**

CDC has created the attached scoring template to assist committees with their selection process. Each reviewer can complete one template for each nominee. The program manager can then tally the scores for all nominees and reviewers on the combined scorecard.

If committees use the attached template, CDC recommends that they also hold meetings to discuss the qualities of the nominees in addition to their quantitative scores, and then vote to select who they will recommend to be their *Champion*. This will ensure that nominees who meet only one or two criteria, but have demonstrated significant accomplishments within those criteria, are not at a disadvantage compared to nominees who meet three or four criteria.

Program managers are asked to notify CDC of their recommendation for the *Champion Award* by **February 19, 2016** by emailing the *Champion's* nomination packet to imzchamps@cdc.gov. The scoring templates and scorecards do not need to be shared with CDC.

Award Criteria	Check all that apply	To what extent do the nominee's activities (described in the nomination narrative) demonstrate that the nominee is a <i>Champion</i> for childhood immunizations in his/her community, state, or territory? For each applicable criterion, mark a score from 1 to 25 .
Leadership: The candidate is considered an authority on immunization in his or her community, medical system, or individual practice. Activities may include acting as a spokesperson, trainer, mentor, or educator.		
Collaboration: The candidate has worked to build support for and increase immunization rates in infants and young children. Activities may include establishing or strengthening partnerships, coalitions, committees, working groups, or other.		
Innovation: The candidate has used creative or innovative strategies to promote immunization or address challenges to immunization in his or her practice, community, state, or region. Activities may include both new strategies and adapting existing strategies in new ways, such as for reaching under-immunized populations.		
Advocacy: The candidate is active in advancing policies and best practices to support immunization in infants and young children in his or her community, state, or region. Activities may include providing legislative testimony or promoting, analyzing, or evaluating policies.
