

General Resources—Immunization Guidelines and Recommendations

- > **IMMUNIZATION SCHEDULES:** The schedules of recommended vaccinations for all age groups are available in several formats at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules.
- > **VACCINE ADMINISTRATION:** Guidelines, screening questions, and contraindications and precautions tables, as well as checklists and comforting techniques for your patients, are available at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/recs/vac-admin. A new self-paced vaccine administration e-Learn course that provides comprehensive training with videos, job aids, and other resources is now available at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/ed/courses.html.
- > **VACCINE STORAGE AND HANDLING:** Storage and handling videos, toolkits, and fact sheets based on ACIP recommendations are available at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/ed/courses.html.
- > **VACCINE INFORMATION STATEMENTS (VISs):** These statements explain vaccine benefits and risks to your patients. Federal law requires you to provide a VIS to patients before administering most vaccines. Print-ready versions are available at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/hcp/vis. Visit the Immunization Action Coalition website at www.immunize.org/vis to find VISs translated into more than 40 languages.



- > **VACCINE ADVERSE EVENT REPORTING SYSTEM (VAERS):** The National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act requires providers to report certain adverse events using this nationwide system. VAERS is also used to analyze data and produce reports. The VAERS website at vaers.hhs.gov has recently been updated along with a new reporting form.



EPIDEMIOLOGY AND PREVENTION OF VACCINE-PREVENTABLE DISEASES (PINK BOOK): The Pink Book is CDC's most comprehensive source of information on vaccine-preventable diseases and recommendations for vaccine use. An electronic version can be found at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/pubs/pinkbook/index.html. Hard copies can be ordered through the Public Health Foundation at bookstore.phf.org/Store/ProductDetails.aspx?productId=27876. A supplement to the current edition, which addresses changes to recommendations for human papillomavirus vaccines, serogroup B meningococcal vaccines, and pneumococcal vaccines, is posted at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/pubs/pinkbook/supplement.html.

- > **YOU CALL THE SHOTS (YCTS):** It is important to stay current with changes in vaccine recommendations. YCTS is a set of training modules on vaccine recommendations and practices, with links to resource materials. YCTS modules are available at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/ed/youcalltheshots.html.
- > **IMMUNIZATION EDUCATION AND TRAINING:** CDC offers numerous education and training programs for health care personnel. A variety of topics and formats are available. Physicians, nurses, health educators, pharmacists, and other health care professionals are invited to apply for continuing education when available. www.cdc.gov/vaccines/ed/index.html.



- > **ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON IMMUNIZATION PRACTICES (ACIP):** ACIP develops recommendations on how to use vaccines to control disease in the United States. The recommendations include the age(s) when vaccines should be given, the number of doses needed, the amount of time between doses, and precautions and contraindications. ACIP recommendations are available at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/hcp/acip-recs/index.html.
- > **GENERAL BEST PRACTICE GUIDELINES FOR IMMUNIZATION:** CDC recommends routine vaccinations to prevent 17 vaccine-preventable diseases that occur in infants, adolescents, and adults. This new report replaces the General Recommendations on Immunization and is available at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/hcp/acip-recs/general-recs/index.html.
- > **CDC TRAVEL VACCINES:** If you or your patients will be traveling outside the United States, visit CDC's travel vaccine web page at wwwnc.cdc.gov/travel for information on recommended vaccines.




Children—Resources for Health Care Professionals

- > **VACCINES FOR CHILDREN (VFC):** This federally funded program provides vaccines at no cost to children who might not be vaccinated because of inability to pay. Additional information, including how you can become a VFC provider, can be found at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/programs/vfc/index.html.
- > **PROVIDER RESOURCES FOR VACCINE CONVERSATIONS WITH PARENTS:** Materials include handouts for parents and information resources for health care professionals. 
