REALITY

Across states in 2018,

53%

of secondary schools did not sell less nutritious foods and beverages on school grounds.* 17%

of secondary schools allowed students to buy fruits and vegetables from vending machines, school stores, canteens, or snack bars. 31%

of secondary schools prohibited school staff from giving students food or food coupons as a reward for good behavior or good academic performance. 39%

of secondary schools prohibited less nutritious foods and beverages from being sold for fundraising purposes.
