

## Percentage\* of Adults Who Are Very Worried About Ability to Pay Medical Bills if They Get Sick or Have an Accident,<sup>†</sup> by Home Ownership<sup>§</sup> and Age Group — National Health Interview Survey, United States, 2019<sup>¶</sup>

<sup>¶</sup> Estimates are based on household interviews of a sample of the civilian, noninstitutionalized U.S. population.

In 2019, 22.6% of renters were very worried about their ability to pay their medical bills if they get sick or have an accident, compared with 13.4% of homeowners. For each age group, renters were more likely than homeowners to be very worried about paying their medical bills: 20.0% compared with 12.9% among those aged 18–39 years, 29.4% compared with 16.8% among those aged 40-64 years, and 16.1% compared with 8.0% among those aged  $\geq 65$  years.
